Free Apps for your Android Smartphone or Tablet

When you buy a phone or tablet, it has some apps already installed, – for example: email, internet and picture editing.

There are hundreds of thousands of apps that you can get from the Apple Apps or Google Play Store etc – but are they free and are they useful?

Apps are rated on a 5-point scale. So check these aspects:

- →Are the ratings based on thousands of people's responses? Is the average rating 4 or better?
- →Are the users' comments informative (not just flattery or unsubstantiated criticism)?


 →Are they really free or just to try for a few days and then you must either buy or
- →Are users complaining about unduly intrusive advertising? If it's free you often pay by tolerating some ads it's your call.

Out of many similar apps, is one of them the official one for the purpose?

Just for starters here are some free apps that are worth trying.



Daily news, world and national, podcasts, and live radio. This is a truly free and ad-free, published by RNZ.



Google Keep is a favourite note-making app. Each note is a separate rectangle of text, displayed in a montage. Tap on one to view in larger text which can be edited, shared by email, pasted into another app (e.g. Word or Google Docs), or ar-

chived for longer term storage. Your Google Keep Notes are available on all your devices. So what you write on your laptop is, within seconds, also viewable on your phone and tablet. On your laptop it is part of the Chrome web browser. Again – cost free, and ad-free too. The Publisher is Google LLC.



If you have a Fitbit (or equivalent) on your wrist, you don't need this. But it actually works – not quite as precise as the real thing, but very easy to use and with a history of each result stored on your device.

There are many heart-rate apps but this one

is a goodie. Note: It does have in-app purchases Publisher is MacroPinch.



Facebook merges Messenger chat service with Instagram

Users will be able to send chats, photos and videos between the two platforms for the first time

Facebook Messenger and Instagram have merged, more than 18 months after the Facebook chief executive Mark Zuckerberg announced his intention to integrate the two platforms.

Instagram's old direct messaging service has been replaced by Messenger, allowing users to send chats, photos and videos between the two platforms for the first time. It is the first step towards a goal announced over a year ago in March 2019 to merge not only those two platforms, but to also incorporate WhatsApp, and to enable end-to-end encryption for all messages sent between the three apps.

"We're connecting the Messenger and Instagram experience to bring some of the best Messenger features to Instagram," said Facebook. "People on Instagram can decide whether to update immediately to this new experience."

They added: "In our research, four out of five people who use messaging apps in the US say that spending more time connecting with friends and family on these apps is



important to them, yet one out of three people sometimes find it difficult to remember where to find a certain conversation thread. With this update, it will be even easier to stay

connected without thinking about which app to use to reach your friends and family. "

Facebook said the new features would be rolled out in "a few countries" immediately, and "globally soon". There is also no timescale for the most controversial plans announced in Zuckerberg's March 2019 blogpost: the integration of WhatsApp with Facebook Messenger and Instagram, and the decision to turn on end-to-end encryption for all conversations on the three platforms.

"We are still determining how cross-app communications will work with WhatsApp," a Facebook spokesperson said. "WhatsApp will continue to remain a separate, end-to-end encrypted app at this time."

The Linux Interest Group has met twice now. At our first meeting we were shown how to install and use ClipGrab, a program which can be used for downloading video/audio clips from YouTube, Facebook etc etc.

At our 2nd meeting we were introduced to Pitivi, a video editor. We took two videos we'd downloaded using ClipGrab and cut parts that we didn't want out of each of them. We then successfully combined the remaining parts into one video. 

Tackling Fake News...a new Netsafe website



Netsafe was founded in 1998 to help New Zealand internet users stay safe online.

A Netsafe survey conducted recently showed that with 52 percent of people admitting they have fallen for fake news, mostly due to misleading articles or headlines, there is a need to help people spot the signs.

Misinformation can impact on people's wellbeing and cause social harm - and the Netsafe survey exposes that Kiwis are not immune. A new Netsafe education campaign aims to teach people how to spot fake news.

Netsafe's survey has revealed 93 percent of Kiwis have heard of the term fake news, nearly half (48 percent) are concerned about mistakenly spreading it and 14 percent mention seeing misleading stories related to COVID-19.

8 in 10 Kiwis recall seeing fake news on social media, 52 percent have seen it on NZ online news sites, 40 percent in print newspapers and 1 in 3 think they have seen it on NZ television.

"People spreading false and misleading information is not a new phenomenon," says Martin Cocker, Netsafe CEO. "However, it is now much easier for anyone to publish and share information online." Variances in digital literacy and the ease in which malicious content can spread means there has never been a greater need for people to develop critical thinking skills.

It can be hard to know where to get started which is why Netsafe has been supported by Facebook to create an education campaign to help people spot fake news and tackle misinformation. The new campaign called Your News Bulletin includes a series of light-hearted videos depicting a newsroom with presenters reporting fake news that will be released on traditional and social media.

The Your News Bulletin 'presenters' use tactics like clickbait, misleading headlines, satire and much more to try to lure people into going to yournewsbulletin.co.nz. Once there you can test your fake news knowledge, learn techniques to identify mis**information** and use the resources to have conversations with family and friends. Here's the link:


