- 3. The Air tickets and accommodation have been booked for 2 committee members to attend the SeniorNet AGM and Symposium to be held in Dunedin this year, on May $5^{th}/6^{th}$.
- 4. Clive demonstrated the recently created club database using the new Microsoft laptop and Office 365. The committee were all impressed and agreed that this will be a greatly enhanced method of record keeping.
- 5. Clive arrived at the meeting wearing a t-shirt ordered and bearing a QR code printed on the front which can be scanned with a smart phone or tablet or similar and leads directly to Motueka SeniorNet's website. VLC Multimedia Player for Windows 10



Microsoft's removal of Windows Media Center from Windows 10 - only to release instead a \$14.99 DVD player app -

has been met with disapproval in some quarters. Even though the app will be free to most people upgrading from Windows 7 and 8, it apparently is very limited and if you reinstall, you may find yourself having to pay. Rather than worrying about any of this, you could just download VLC.

VLC is a very capable media player, happy to play DVDs and other video but also able to handle a range of different audio files. Easy to use and with a good range of controls and keyboard shortcuts, VLC can also be augmented by downloading software plugins. VLC is a free cross-platform multimedia player that plays most multimedia files as well as DVDs, Audio CDs, VCDs, and various streaming protocols. VLC runs on all versions of Windows, from Windows XP SP3 to the last version of Windows 10.

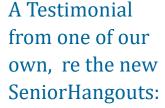
Some brief notes from our recent ADUG Meeting in January 2021: Finishing off from the November session with Google Maps as a subject, we downloaded maps for offline use. This feature is convenient when travelling in an area without cell phone coverage or for those who have nil or very little mobile data. It is recommended to download in advance while connected to WiFi.

We all then downloaded and installed 3 apps, FreeView Guide for NZ, MetService and RNZ (Radio New Zealand). For each of the apps we also looked at the corresponding mobile websites on our smartphones or tablets, for comparison.

We explored and compared the functionality of app vs the websites. Some of us found the free view website better than the app. RNZ app and website were more or less identical whereas for the normal purpose of just looking at the weather forecast the Metservice app was easy to use and sufficient. However the app does not cater for some of the other forecasts like rural, marine, and mountains and parks so the website needs to be used.

It was pointed out that for smartphones with limited memory it is sometimes of advantage to create an icon of the website and use the website for the desired functionality instead of using the app, as apps require a good amount of your device storage.

For the next session we plan to look at our smartphone cameras, their setting options and more, apart from exploring more apps and assisting with any problems and queries members of the group may have.

I intend to join other Senior Hangouts in the future.

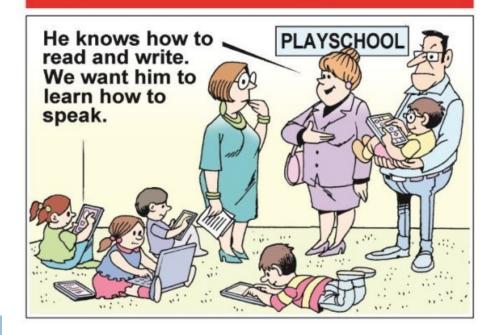
The topics are of interest to all even if one thinks otherwise. I found to learn what others are experiencing along life's way is information we all need, in order to make informed decisions on life.

Facebook vs Australia

The battle between the Australian government and the tech giants over a law which would make them pay for news content has been rumbling on for a while.



But Facebook's move to ban all Australian news content from its platform has taken the conflict to a whole new level. One of Rupert Murdoch's newspapers described it as "an act of war". But others see the actions of Australia's politicians as being an outrage against the principle of net neutrality. Did Mark Zuckerberg overplay his hand, making it more likely that other countries will follow Australia's lead? Did they botch it? FB's bold move has caused politicians around the world rethink how they regulate this company, as some now seem even more determined to clip its wings. For one thing, the way Facebook carried out its bold move ended up looking ham-fisted.

"FB ended up looking ham-fisted. They botched it," says Steve Evans, a reporter for the Canberra Times. Facebook faced a wave of global outrage and accusations of acting like a bully.

Postscript! Since the above was published, Australia has passed a world-first law aimed at making Google and Facebook pay for news content on their platforms. The legislation had been fiercely opposed by the US tech giants. But Facebook has now unblocked its news content,. This new law is seen as a test case for similar regulation around the world.

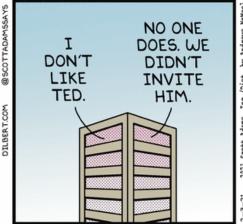

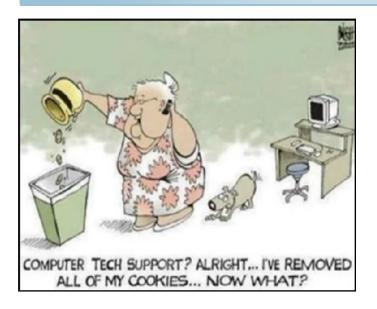

Some quick notes from the February 19th session:

- Our first video was of a novel use for iPads apps for cats, with real-life cats chasing make-believe mice, butterflies and other creatures on an iPad. Then a more serious video from MacMost on taking a photo by talking to your iPad.
- "Things you may not know" was the subject for much of the rest of the meeting where we looked at interesting functions in commonly used apps. Colin started the ball rolling by showing that you can find the address of the sender of a suspicious email by tapping the from title at the top of the email. The menu that appears allows you to block the sender or, alternatively, to add the sender's details to the Contacts list.
- Password managers were discussed, and while all agreed they are an excellent option, it was generally felt that Apple's Keychain offered sufficient protection.

Should you keep using WhatsApp? Plus five tips to start the year with your digital privacy intact

A reporter spoke to convicted hacker turned security consultant Kevin Mitnick to find out how to maintain your security online. Shelley Hepworth, The Guardian 16 January 2021

If you use the popular messaging service WhatsApp, you may have noticed a pop-up message in recent days asking you to accept the service's new terms and conditions by 8 February in order to continue using it.

The update has prompted calls for users to leave the popular messaging service in favour of alternatives such as Signal and Telegram. And on Friday a legal challenge on privacy grounds was filed against WhatsApp in India, the service's biggest market. Telegram CEO Pavel Durov has reported an influx of 25 million global users to the rival service since the announcement was made.

But what do the new T's&C's mean for you? We asked former most-wanted hacker turned security consultant Kevin Mitnick which messaging app he prefers – and to share his tips to set yourself up for a cyber-safe 2021.

You can read WhatsApp's Q&A about the changes, but the main thing to know is that messages remain end-to-end encrypted and WhatsApp maintains that neither it, nor anyone else, has access to the content of messages between friends, family and groups. But Remember - WhatsApp users are really Facebook customers now – it's getting harder to forget that. While choosing a messaging service is an important choice, there are other ways you can ensure your digital security. Here are MitnicKs top five tips for protecting your privacy online.

1. Use a password manager. Make your master password a full sentence with all the spaces and correct capitalisation, such as "I went to Byron Bay today". The password manager will do the heavy lifting from there. Every time you visit a site, it will either autofill your existing password or, if it's a new site, create a strong password for you. Password managers can also scan your current passwords for weaknesses and recommend stronger versions that conform with randomness..

2. Implement two-factor authentication

- 3. Use a VPN Mitnick says whenever you're not on your home or work network you should be using a VPN a virtual private network which keeps your browsing safe from spying.
- 4. Do security awareness training There are security courses available for free online that walk you through different areas of consumer-based security, including passwords, online banking, avoiding malware, keeping your personal information confidential, protecting your kids online, and securing your home network, email and attachments.

5. Keep your financial transactions separate.

Not everyone will be able to implement this last tip and Mitnick acknowledges it's a pain, however it's a good idea to use a separate device for financial transactions.
